I. The Responsibility of Teachers (v. 1)

II. The Power of the Tongue (v. 2–5a)

- 1. Bit in a horse's mouth controls the whole body.

III. The Destructive Potential of the Tongue (v. 5b–8)

- 1. The tongue can cause immense damage.
- 2. It reflects deeper issues of the heart.
- 3. James emphasizes that no one can fully tame it—showing our need for God's help.
- 4. Why is the tongue so hard to control?
- 5. How can believers seek to tame their tongues?

IV. The Inconsistency of the Tongue (v. 9–12)

- 1. Spring of water can't produce both fresh and salty water.
- 2. Fig tree/vine can't bear other kinds of fruit.
- 3. Hypocrisy in speech is unacceptable for a believer.
- 4. Our words should consistently reflect God's nature.
